



REV. JOSEPH C . TAPHORN APPOINTED 15th rector of the saint paul seminary

On July 16, 2018, The Saint Paul Seminary's Board of Trustees approved Archbishop Bernard Hebda's appointment of the Rev. Joseph C. Taphorn, JCL, as the 15th Rector of The Saint Paul Seminary. Father Taphorn will succeed Msgr. Aloysius Callaghan who has served as Rector and Vice President of The Saint Paul Seminary School of Divinity since his appointment in 2005.

The Omaha native was ordained a priest of the Archdiocese of Omaha in 1997 after receiving his theological formation at the Pontifical College Josephinum in Columbus, Ohio, earning both a Master of Arts in Theology and a Master of Divinity

degree. He earned his bachelor's degree from Benedictine College in 1993. Father Taphorn has served as founding pastor and director of the St. John Paul II Newman Center at the University of Nebraska at Omaha since 2016.

Father Taphorn earned a licentiate in canon law (JCL) from the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome in 2002 and served at a number of parishes and in various administrative roles in the Archdiocese of Omaha, including Moderator of the Curia, Chancellor and Spokesperson, Judicial Vicar, Vicar for Clergy and Ecumenical Officer. In addition to serving the Archdiocese on the College of Consultors, the Presybteral Council and the Finance Council, he has served on the board of the Nebraska Catholic Conference and as an officer of Catholic Mutual Group. He also served on the steering committee and leadership team establishing a pastoral plan for parishes and schools in the Archdiocese of Omaha.

In addition, Father Taphorn has distinguished himself in his ministry to priests, seminarians and young adults. In 2017, he received certification in the Spirituality of the Diocesan Priesthood and Spiritual Direction from the

Institute for Priestly Formation in Omaha, where he continues to serve as a spiritual director for the institute's summer program for diocesan seminarians. He has collaborated extensively with the Fellowship of Catholic University Students (FOCUS) and Franciscan University of Steubenville Youth Conferences to provide retreats and conferences on college campuses at the local, regional and national levels.

"I am thrilled that Father Taphorn, with the generous permission of Archbishop George Lucas, has accepted this appointment," Archbishop Hebda said. "His love for the Lord and his Church, as well as his pastoral heart and extensive experience working with priests, seminarians and young people, will well serve the seminarians, seminary staff and the broader community. Knowing his love for the Eucharist and his commitment to humble, collaborative, Christ-centered service, I am confident that he will be an effective role model for our seminarians and lay students as they prepare for ministry."

Father Taphorn will begin his term as Rector on January 1, 2019. Bishop Andrew H. Cozzens, S.T.D., who chaired the Rector Search Committee, will serve in the interim.

The seminary's Board of Trustees, bishops, priests, seminarians, family and friends gathered for the Rector's Council Dinner on April 18 to celebrate Msgr. Callaghan's 13 years of service and leadership as Rector and Vice President of The Saint Paul Seminary School of Divinity.

SERVICE THAT NEVER STOPS

After serving 19 years on The Saint Paul Seminary faculty, Dr. Charlotte Berres, CSJ, associate director of pastoral formation, is retiring. However, when you talk to this tiny woman with white hair on top, a lifetime of service behind her, and a long list of plans for the future, you know Sr. Charlotte is not done yet.

"My life is value driven," she says. "There is value in seeing God at work in the diocese, in the parish and in a seminarian."

That explains the more than 30 years she served the Church in Canada – in the "bush" in Prince George, British Columbia, and later in a parish in Ottawa. It also explains her return to her childhood home in St. Paul to care for her elderly parents and older brother with Down syndrome. And, it explains the 20 years she cared for developmentally disabled adults in that same home while serving in local parishes. By the time she completed her Masters and Doctoral degrees in Pastoral Ministry in the 1990s, Charlotte had already amassed a lifetime of service and experience.

"She has a passion for the Church and has given her life to forming priests with a pastoral heart," said Fr. Allen Kuss, director of Pastoral Formation and the Teaching Parish Program.

It is no wonder that this force of nature is behind the seminary's robust and highly regarded pastoral ministry programs, including: Spiritual Pastoral Ministry, the Teaching Parish Program, Evangelization in Action, Spanish Immersion, Deacon Summer Placements and January-Term Parish Assignments. It is no wonder that the men who participate in these programs are well prepared to serve the people in their parishes.

"Sr. Charlotte, together with Fr. Kuss, has enhanced our pastoral formation programs from good to great," Msgr. Callaghan said. "She has given herself totally to the important work of evangelization for more than 19 years. She has been a wonderful example of diligence, dedication and determination in moving forward the work of pastoral formation in a way that addresses the needs of young seminarians, as well as multicultural opportunities in the Church today. The Saint Paul Seminary School of Divinity owes Sr. Charlotte a debt of gratitude."







IRELAND SCHOLAR CALLED TO EVANGELIZE BY MARGARET JOHNSON

School of Divinity alumnus Susanna Parent is the Evangelization Manager for the Office of Evangelization and Catechesis at the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis. Her journey to this current position was driven by a fire to grow educationally and spiritually. That journey included completing the Master of Arts in Pastoral Ministry (MAPM) degree at The Saint Paul Seminary School of Divinity in 2016.

Susanna was a Catholic Studies major at the University of St. Thomas when she applied for and was awarded the John Ireland Scholarship, a full-tuition scholarship offered annually by The Saint Paul Seminary School of Divinity to recent graduates of the University of St. Thomas.* Inspired by Mother Teresa's quote, "In order to keep the lamp lit, you have to keep putting oil in it," Susanna wanted to be a witness of the Lord's love and to continue learning and growing.



REAL PARTICIPATION IN THE GOSPEL

Every person who works in development has heard the comment. Sometimes it is a veiled affirmation: "I could never raise money for a living." Sometimes it takes the form of a good-humored jab: "She is the one you don't want to meet," or, "Watch your wallet when you are with him."



These comments point to a sometimes-incorrect perception of fundraising, especially in the Catholic arena. Raising money can be considered taboo—something you are not supposed to talk about in church, especially in a homily. It can be viewed as a "necessary evil," something we have to do but no one likes to do, like taking out the trash.

However, giving of our financial resources is nothing less than living out our Gospel call. It is part of what it means to be a disciple. It is real participation in advancing the mission of the particular organization we are supporting. That is why many places have changed their name from Fundraising Office to the Office of Mission Advancement.

Archbishop Bernard Hebda articulated this point well at one of the many fundraising events he attended this past spring. He noted that the vast majority of us are not able to evangelize young people, feed the poor, care for the sick or celebrate the sacraments on a full-time basis. The vast majority participate in the primary work of the Church by giving of our resources. The hungry are not fed, the young not evangelized, the priest not formed, the sick not cared for without the generosity of many, many people.

Similarly, I have heard benefactors say to those working in the nonprofit world, "You are doing the real work, I am just writing the checks." I understand where the comment

comes from and greatly appreciate the affirmation it contains. However, here too, is a nuance that requires clarification because I see how hard people have worked over the years to earn the resources they have. And I see that after all the hard work, toil and labor, they give the resources to the Church. I find this truly amazing and incredibly edifying.

In the end, it takes all. Some give by *going*; others give by *giving*. The giving of one's particular resources is real participation in the Gospel.

There are many reasons to make a Will, ten of which were listed in the Winter 2018 issue of the *Oracle*. Some of the most important reasons include when children are involved, when one's assets are complicated, and when trying to avoid probate and litigation.

However, there are also situations in which a Will would not be required. Todd Johnson, certified financial planner, private wealth advisor and friend of The Saint Paul Seminary, shares other options to consider when transferring assets and charitable giving.

Assuming no minor children are involved, in what situation would a Will not be required?
A If every asset has a named beneficiary designation, the asset transfers directly to that named individual or organization at death without having to go through Probate or inquire of any Will. Simply put: beneficiary designations override a Will. It is only those assets that have no named beneficiary (or are not owned in a Trust) that go to Probate where, at that time, your Will would be necessary.
Q Without a will, how are assets transferred to a designated beneficiary?
A Most assets can be transferred by simply filling out a designated beneficiary form provided by the financial institution that holds your asset. Examples include life insurance policies, Brokerage Accounts, IRA's, 401(k)'s and Bank Accounts. Even a house can have a named beneficiary designation by signing a Transfer on Death Deed (TODD) form.
Q Are there advantages to transferring assets without a Will?
If you meet the criteria mentioned above, it can be simpler and less expensive to transfer assets via a beneficiary designation verses a Will. In addition, designated beneficiaries can be changed by the account owner at any time at no cost.
Q Is there anything else you would like to share about the importance of being good stewards of our God-given resources?
"Do not withhold good from those to whom it is due, when it is in your power to act." Proverbs 3:27

TO BE WISE STEWARDS OF OUR FINANCES

INCOME – An example is tithing in which you donate 10% of your annual income to the church or other charitable institutions.

ASSETS – For example, donating appreciated assets within a Brokerage Account to a qualified charity. If you are 70 ½ or older, you could also direct your annual Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your IRA to a charity which can reduce your income taxes while making a difference for the receiving charity. While you will not receive an income tax deduction for a rollover gift, you will not pay any income tax on the transfer.

ESTATE - IRA and 401(k) assets that pass to non-spouse beneficiaries (e.g. children) are fully taxable. Instead, any IRA and 401(k) assets that are passed to a charitable organization transfer without any tax implications.
